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Section 1: Strategic Overview

1.1 Executive Summary

The University's Annual Plan for 2013 was consolidated from the annual plans submitted by the SLT as part of this year's planning process.

Major strategic initiatives for the University's Annual Plan for 2013 can be summarised as follows:

- Implement that Digital Teaching and Learning Strategy
- Implement the Student Success Strategy
- Continue the implementation of the Internationalisation Strategy

- Develop and implement External Relations Plans for Pasifika and Māori students and the Wellington campus
- Increase enrolment in our key target markets: new distance learners, students on the Albany campus and under 25's
- Build NZ's biggest network of actively engaged alumni

Responsibility:

- Launch and promote new Expertise Database so that all relevant outlets are aware of 'Massey Offer'
- Further development and implementation of the Sustainability Framework
- Further progress the Heritage Project

Generating Income:

- Gain approval for long-term Financial Strategy and develop and long-term financial plan
- Progress Treasury Governance and Management

Enabling Excellence:

- Initiatives for staff development and conduct of staff surveys
- Initiatives to enhance students success and experience

Section 2: Introduction

The University's annual plans are developed to give effect to the vision and strategy in the University's strategic plan, The Road to 2020, 2012 update (Massey University, The Engine of the new New Zealand).¹

"In recent years New Zealand's place in the world has changed; a new New Zealand is emerging.

New Zealanders are carving out their futures, confident that they have something unique to offer the world. They aspire to break new ground, foster new communities, advance new ways of working and promote a distinct and valued Kiwi world view.

To succeed in challenging times, New Zealanders must be not only academically and technically equipped, but also creative, innovative and connected. They need to build on the traditional strengths that come from our land-based industries as well as the new and diverse activities that are advancing New Zealand's contribution to the "big issues" of the age – sustainable resource use, citizenship in a digital world, community resilience in times of natural and induced environmental challenges, global economic issues, health and wellbeing and food security, to name but a few.

As New Zealand's defining tertiary education institution, Massey University provided the underpinning knowledge for our nation's successful development in much of the 20th century. In the 21st century we aspire once again to serve and lead as the "engine" of this new New Zealand.

Today the University has a well established reputation for outstanding teaching and research grounded in real-world issues. We are New Zealand's national university, with three campuses and a distance education programme through which we teach 34,000 students from more than 100 countries. We have an excellent record of engagement with all our communities, and are proud to support educational opportunity in New Zealand and around the world.

A university for the future

We are committed to enhancing student access to the University's academic programmes through ensuring relevance and quality while continuing to embrace digital technologies.

In the next decade, our reputation for supporting and adding value to New Zealand's land-based industries will see the University continue its contribution to the global agenda for food security, develop sustainable resource management strategies and advance precision agriculture. A new "smart thinking" approach to the use of our nation's natural resources means that Massey is also well placed to lead in the sustainable use of biological and natural materials, and to advance exports of foods, nutraceuticals and other high-value post-harvest products.

As host to the nation's only Veterinary School, alongside the Riddet Institute ("New Zealand's food visionary") we have a unique opportunity to contribute to research on animal health and human wellbeing. Through its potential to generate new knowledge, that research will extend Massey's already extensive contributions to disease prevention and health promotion.

Through the Design School's 125-year leadership of design and fine arts in New Zealand, the University is at the forefront of a unique creative arts movement that sees New Zealand design now centre stage in world fashion, industrial design and digital media.

Our commitment to promoting the development of indigenous knowledge and advancing Māori achievement ensures that we are part of a culturally rich community that respects diversity in a modern context for the benefit of this nation and its partner countries. And our wider expertise in applied social sciences will see Massey contribute to changes in urban dynamics that will define growth in New Zealand and contribute to the emerging debate around citizenship and identity in the 21st century. As New Zealand and the world have changed, so have we.

Our strategy to 2020

Since 2009, Massey has been driven by an ambitious strategy to inspire change in New Zealand and take what is special about our country to the world.

The strategy is founded on the values of creativity, innovation and connectedness. With a record of providing one of the most comprehensive teaching and research programmes of any university, we have identified areas of specialisation that define the contribution Massey wants to make. In the year ahead we intend to reform our academic structure to include a new College of Health alongside the Colleges of Business, Creative Arts and Sciences, and form a new Institute for Education within the College of Humanities and Social Sciences.

During 2011 we made significant progress in the work needed for the University to meet its goals – and reflecting this, the 2012 update of *The Road to 2020* outlines a fully revised research strategy and academic programme. We will continue to expand our opportunities for lifelong learning and advance our internationalisation strategy. Our branding, marketing and engagement plans are being implemented, and we have identified a number of sustainability-related issues to which University staff will apply their knowledge. We will work on diversifying our revenue base and improve the support we provide to staff and students, especially in information technology (IT) and campus facilities. In early 2012 we will open a new Creative Arts building in Wellington and a new Student Amenities building in Albany, as well as complete the refurbishment of the AgHort facilities in Manawatu.

Massey University is an institution with a real sense of purpose and momentum, thanks to the extraordinary efforts of staff, students and the many partners that support us. We live in challenging times, but we are determined to make a defining contribution to our nation while building a world-wide reputation as a leading centre for higher education and scholarship. We welcome all who wish to be part of this engine of the new New Zealand".

The University's Annual Plan for 2013 aims to continue the progress already made on the Road to 2020.

Section 3: Environmental Update

Massey's Operating Environment and Fiscal Position²

This section will discuss some of the challenges ahead as Massey University progresses towards achieving the vision to be New Zealand's defining university and a world leader in higher education and scholarship.

The key to success is to be financially sustainable, and this is an overview of where Massey University's revenue and costs are headed so that Massey will continue to meet this goal.

Massey's biggest funder, is the Government, though part of the Road to 2020 strategy is to diversify Massey's revenue base and move away from reliance on Government funding. This is progressing well and will be discussed further in this section.

In mid-2012, Massey University was developing their investment plan which was the key document necessary to secure funding for the university over the next two to three years. As part of this process the Government through the TEC provides its expectations of universities and Massey is required to explain how they will best achieve them. This is a brief outline of these expectations as they are important for Massey and for New Zealand's future.

- The first is that Māori and Pasifika learners participate and achieve at all levels at least on par with other students. Our new Kia Marama strategy builds on the successes we have had in this area.
- The second is excellence and distinctiveness of institutional mission that is universities need to focus on institutional strengths and support performance and quality and
- The third is to be active and successful in knowledge transfer from research activities and linkages with industry. The focus is to increase the impact universities can have on New Zealand's development, through knowledge exchange, collaboration, research, and commercialisation strategies.

All three of these expectations are well covered in the Road to 2020 and its sub-strategies. The academic reform programme across all colleges is key to achieving this as is the implementation of the recently released research strategy. The formation of a new College of Health and Institute of Education position Massey not only at the forefront of research and scholarship but shows Massey's distinctiveness in terms of driving both economic growth and relevance to the new New Zealand.

Though Massey is well aligned to the Government's and TEC's expectations of Universities there are a number of new challenges on the horizon for Massey as the Government is not only reducing its funding in real terms for student programs, but it is also reprioritising the existing funds amongst tertiary education providers. In the Government's budget in 2012 there wasn't an across the board increase for universities though universities are facing increasing costs yearly. This is likely to continue into the future as the Government grapples with its budgetary problems.

Modest increases were targeted at Science and Engineering. At best this will mean about a \$1Million increase for Massey next year. It is not much when Massey has a total cost base of around \$440 Million and this will increase with inflation. Insurance costs alone are expected to increase by another half a million dollars next year.

Another concern is the introduction of the new performance linked funding policy which has the potential to reduce funding for universities. This new measure is based on Educational Performance Indicators relating to course and qualification completion, student progression and student retention. The formula does not appear to adequately address the fact that Massey has a large number of students enrolled in distance learning and there are many factors relating to course non-completion that are outside Massey's control. If TEC does not recognise, and make appropriate adjustment for these factors then it is likely that the gains from Science and Engineering will be more than lost through the introduction of performance linked funding.

PBRF changes are another challenge. Significant work across the University ensured that the portfolios submitted for the PBRF were the best possible. This puts Massey in the most advantageous position for securing future funding. The rules around the PBRF assessment are currently changing and the impact on Massey's revenue stream is yet to be known.

As mentioned earlier, the 2020 strategy is to be less reliant on Government revenue and hence the need to keep growing our international and commercial revenue to replace Government funding. Being connected and growing partnerships with private sector organisations and other education providers, nationally and internationally, is the key to generate research and tuition income from a much broader base. The challenge is to grow these revenues at a greater rate than the costs are increasing.

This is something that Massey has been incredibly successful in achieving in the past. Since 2008 Massey has only had a 3.3% increase in its total funding from Government, whereas Massey's costs have been increasing close to that percentage each year.

Last year, Massey University received an extra \$1.2 M from Government but the costs rose \$9.8M. This was turned around by increasing revenue and controlling costs with the result that Massey made a surplus of \$7.6M. This is still outside the TEC's specified target, which would require a surplus of \$13M, but it is still very commendable.

Surpluses are very important to Massey as these are needed for reinvestment in capital programmes each year. Massey doesn't retain any of these surpluses, but reinvest them in IT and buildings that make the university both a good place to work and to study. It also means less exposure to external risks as there is more capability to adjust to economic shocks. Massey University becomes more resilient. If something happens Massey will not need to slash budgets as Otago has done recently. Hence, the challenge for Budget 2013 for Massey University is to build on the positive work that has been done over recent years as part of the Road to 2020 strategy so that Massey continues to be both successful and resilient to the changing economic environment.

With the Government changes, it's a measure more difficult this year to obtain financial sustainability but it is achievable if Massey continues to grow revenue and be both strategic and mindful in expenditure decisions.

These are things that need to be thought about when staff are putting budgets together for 2013.

Massey is known for being creative and innovative and this is a key to future success.

In relation to expenditure decisions, being strategic is about placing capital investment and operational expenditure into areas that provide the greatest alignment to the Road to 2020 goals. This means thinking about where Massey gets the highest return for its expenditure and stop doing things that are low priority.

It is always easy to increase activities within the University, and forget that when this occurs, with limited resource, activities must stop that don't add a lot of value. Services that are provided need to prioritised, and the question asked as to whether some of these services that add little value can be discontinued.

Being mindful is about making considered decisions when expenditure is incurred. Massey has been progressing a significant programme to make savings in procurement. The main saving however is not from negotiating a lower price for the same goods or services from a supplier, the main saving is by being mindful about the choices that Massey makes, and just like with growing revenue it's about being creative and innovative in how staff members do things.

For example, Massey have completed procurement contracts to leverage the number of bed nights and receive great rates for hotel accommodation. Being mindful about the expenditure is not only ensuring that Massey uses those suppliers but considering whether there is a need to travel at all. Massey has some great video-conferencing facilities and these need to be considered too. If staff do need to travel, then taking best value fares rather than flexi fares may be a great option.

Being mindful about what Massey choose to purchase and how it is purchased it is a painless way to make savings.

Similarly the redesign of processes can achieve business efficiencies. Massey staff are in a unique position to recognise what works, what doesn't and what can be done better. There must be an aim to get the best value possible so that income is freed up to use in the areas that count – the areas that grow Massey University's reputation and income by boosting teaching and research capability and the successes that flow from that.

Everyone's efforts will help Massey not only to be financially sustainable but will underpin its success as the engine of the new New Zealand".

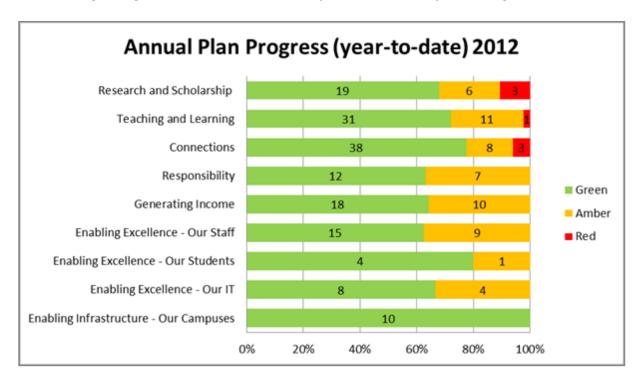
Performance Review³

Planning for 2013 has been informed by progress to date against the Big Goals in the University's strategic plan, The Road to 2020. This progress is detailed in the Statement of Service Performance in the University's Annual Report 2011. Progress during 2012, extracted from the Quarter Two Performance and Risk Report to SLT and Council, is summarised below.

Overall

Generally, progress against planned activities is tracking well, as are the key performance indicators. Progress against the key initiatives in the University's Annual Plan for 2012 has been summarised in Table 1 below. Note that the numbers in the bar represent the number of initiatives in that bar for the Big Goal.

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Research and Scholarship

- Research performance indicators are generally showing mixed trends. For example, licences/commercialisation revenue is well above target yet the negative variance from target in total external research income reflects both an adverse external funding climate as well as the work to be done to improve overall performance to a nominal \$100M per annum against current year budget \$80M (inclusive of consultancy income)
- Preparations for the PBRF round remained a key focus with the final submission due in July. (This deadline was subsequently met)
- The Research Strategy implementation plan has now been approved by the Research Committee
- A Research Communication Strategy is being implemented after SLT approval

Teaching and Learning

- The College of Health Proposal has been approved by Council with an establishment committee now operational
- The final decision to establish the Massey University Institute of Education has been made with an implementation team now meeting weekly
- Implementation plans for the Internationalisation Strategy have been progressing well with distance education, offshore and pathways for local (resident) international students, receiving focus at this point
- The Māori@Massey 2020: KIA MARAMA Strategy has been reviewed, developed and approved by SLT
- Distance Education and Learning Futures Alliance is now established and has officially been launched

Connections

- All university activity across events, publications and digital media has been reviewed and is in accordance with the latest branding and messaging
- The Research and Communications Framework was approved which includes profiling Massey staff expertise to key stakeholders
- Links with industry, business, the community and public sectors continue to be strengthened with engagements and agreements made with Te Wānanga o Aotearoa, Aotearoa Fisheries, NZ Police, Auckland City, Auckland Tertiary Education Network, and Venture Taranaki

Responsibility

- A 'lite touch' audit template has been circulated to academic and service units with the goal to map progress with embedding of sustainability within academic, research and scholarship and the wider functions of the University
- The "History of Massey" project is progressing well with work under in consultation with Massey Heritage Advisory Group
- The WW! Centennial History Project is now an integrated collaboration between Massey, NZ MCH, RSA and NZDF

Generating Income

- Development of the University Financial Strategy and long-term financial model is currently underway
- Implementation of the Procurement Strategy is well underway with considerable improvements made to procurement capability, templates and tools this year

Enabling Excellence

- Two six-month Employee Development Calendars promoted over 170 programmes attended by around 1,500 participants across all three campuses
- Participation indicators for the TEC's targeted groups of students are all under target for the year-to-date although Māori and Pasifika students are trending favourable
- Initiatives relating to the University's Information Services Strategic Plan continue to be implemented
- Planning of stage one of the strategy to relocate Hokowhitu onto the Turitea campus has commenced with relocation of the College of Education starting in November 2012
- Te reo initiatives have continued to expand in print and online with the bilingualisation of the accommodation guide, the graduation publications and Massey homepage
